Message from the President

The Minnesota Chapter continues to be a national leader in providing education and outreach for the public works industry. I'm proud to be part of such a strong, positive organization that is not just surviving, but thriving, in difficult times.

We have seen growth in membership, training programs, and conference attendance over the past few years, which is exceptional given the realities of this economy.

The American Public Works Association has again recognized the accomplishments of APWA-MN with the Presidential Achievement for Chapter Excellence (PACE) Award, the seventh year in a row. This recognition is a result of the leadership, hard work, and dedication of a number of volunteers who donate their time and talents on various APWA-MN committees. These efforts deliver the education, training, and professional networking opportunities essential for the infrastructure that makes our quality of life possible. Our economy depends on it, our schools depend on it, and our communities depend on it. What we do, and its importance, is a story that we all need to tell in our areas of influence.

Late this summer, we were again reminded of the role of the public works industry in maintaining our culture's sense of "normal." Hurricane Irene barreled its way up the Eastern Seaboard, causing an estimated \$15 billion in damage from South Carolina to Maine.

I noticed that a significant amount of media coverage concerned what the public traditionally sees as "first responders" (e.g., police and fire services). However, I believe that much of the work to protect our everyday life falls to the public works industry. Clearly, in the aftermath of a natural disaster, it is the public works industry that provides the equipment, labor, and expertise to clean up and restore the infrastructure essential to our communities.

And, while not routinely reported in the media, the people in our industry are exposed to dangerous conditions while performing their service to the public. A 30-year public works employee of Rutland, Vermont, together with his son, lost their lives to the floodwaters of Hurricane Irene while working to keep the water supply safe for their small community. Earlier this year, Minnesota lost one of its own in the line of duty when a MnDOT employee, Michael Struck, lost his life while working in response to Minnesota River flooding near St. Peter.

Our industry is there, 24/7, doing the work the public has come to expect, but not always to appreciate.

I urge you to take the extra step of sharing the public works story where it can make a difference. The Minnesota Chapter will continue to provide the education, training, and professional opportunities that are essential to maintaining Minnesota's infrastructure.

Thank you and keep up the great work!

Stormwater regs got you down? Maybe you need some MIDS!

Stormwater management has evolved substantially over the past 20 years. Historically, the goal was to move stormwater off the landscape quickly and reduce flooding concerns. Now we are focusing on keeping the raindrop where it falls and mimicking natural hydrology in order to minimize the amount of pollution reaching our receiving waters.

As new methods and techniques are being developed, there are an increasing number of standards, water quality goals, and requirements from a regulatory environment that is becoming increasingly complex. The result has been confusion, frustration, and worse — public works professionals are often labeled as being the “bad guy” or “uncooperative” or “unimaginative.” This has created a need for better communication and a standardization of the goals and objectives.

In response to this need, and advanced by a diverse group of partners, the Minnesota Legislature allocated funds to “develop performance standards, design standards or other tools to enable and promote the implementation of low impact development and other stormwater management techniques.” (Minnesota Statutes 2009, section 115.03, subdivision 5c).

Minimal Impact Design Standards (MIDS) represent the next generation of stormwater management and contains three main elements that address current challenges:

1. A higher clean water performance goal for new development and redevelopment that will provide enhanced protection for Minnesota’s water resources.
2. New modeling methods and credit calculations that will standardize the use of a range of “innovative” structural and nonstructural stormwater techniques.
3. A credits system and ordinance package that will allow for increased flexibility and a streamlined approach to regulatory programs for developers and communities.



For the last 18 months, the MIDS team, along with the consultants hired by the Minnesota Pollution Control Agency, have been working to come up with some base, uniform standards that could be applied against new development. From this, it is hoped that the standards can then be widely adopted by various regulatory entities, eliminating the double-triple jeopardy that many implementers face when undertaking a project. Once the new development standards are refined and completed, the effort will look at other thorny regulatory issues such as retrofits and linear projects.

The first phase of the MIDS effort is being wrapped up, and there are some significant outcomes. First, the MIDS Work Group agreed on a performance goal for new developments across most of the state that the first 1.1-inches of stormwater from impervious areas will be treated onsite (generally using infiltration). Second, it was agreed that there are significant areas of the state that make infiltration impractical; for these areas, flexible treatment options will be developed over the next six to nine months by the MIDS Work Group and its consultants. Third, a Performance Calculator has been developed that allows designers and regulators the ability to gauge the overall effectiveness of a wide range of treatment practices that might be employed on a given site.

The relevance of history in public works

As the current president of the Public Works Historical Society (Society), I am often asked about the benefits and reasons for joining our group. The answer was brought home to me again just the other day on a conference call with the other trustees of the PWHS. We were discussing our newest oral history venture — an interview with Robert Albee. Those of you who attended Congress in Boston may have been fortunate enough to attend his session on the Big Dig.

Robert Albee, former Boston city engineer and Central Artery/Tunnel construction director, is managing director of Telecommunications Engineering for VHB, an engineering, land planning, and environmental services firm with private and public clients. Bob was in charge of the Big Dig, and prior to the start of the project he had his staff read *The Power Broker: Robert Moses and the Fall of New York* by Robert Caro.

According to Wikipedia, “Robert Moses’ works remain extremely controversial. His critics claim that he preferred automobiles to people, that he displaced hundreds of thousands of residents in New York City, uprooted traditional neighborhoods by building expressways through them, contributed to the ruin of the South Bronx and the amusement parks of Coney Island, caused the departure of the Brooklyn Dodgers and the New York Giants Major League baseball teams, and precipitated the decline of public transport through disinvestment and neglect.”

Bob wanted his staff to learn from the mistakes of another historical figure responsible for numerous infrastructure projects in New York City, prior to undertaking the Big Dig, in hopes that a greater sensitivity would be shown by staff members during the project.

Join the Public Works Historical Society.

The PWHS logo depicts the nation’s first federal public work, the Cape Henry Lighthouse at Chesapeake Bay, Virginia (at right). The lighthouse was built in 1791 at the specific direction of the first Congress of the United States, President George Washington and Treasury Secretary Alexander Hamilton were personally involved with the project. The lighthouse was built on the site of the landing of the *Susan Constant*, the ship carrying settlers who founded Jamestown in 1607 — the first permanent English-speaking colony in the new world. It stands today as a historical monument, not only to our nation’s heritage but also to the timelessness of public works.



Membership is comprised of public works practitioners, historians, authors, and educators, and is open to all, regardless of APWA affiliation. The annual dues are \$35, and can be paid separately or with APWA dues. For membership information, visit www.apwa.net/About/SIG/PWHS/member.asp.

The mission of the Society is to enhance the planning and management of public works programs, and to promote public understanding and appreciation of the role of public works in the growth and development of civilization. The Society accomplishes this mission through the collection, preservation, and dissemination of public works history.

Specifically, the goals of the Society are to:

- Foster scholarly research and publication;
- Support collaboration among public works practitioners, historians, and educators;
- Encourage the preservation of historically significant public works;
- Promote historical awareness and activities throughout APWA; and
- Collect and preserve records of individuals and groups engaged in important public works activities.

It was chartered in 1975 by the American Public Works Association (APWA) to prepare a history of public works in America to coincide with the United States bicentennial. Our official formation was announced at the Cosmos Club in Washington, D.C., on April 10, 1975. Senator Jennings Randolph, then Chairman of the Senate Public Works Committee, was the principal speaker. The Society’s first annual meeting followed later that year in New Orleans.

During our 35-year history, the Society has evolved as a historical organization, having published volumes of books, essays, and articles; administered research grants; sponsored award programs; and hosted academic seminars and meetings.

MnDOT debuts Minnesota GO visioning process

In February 2011, the Minnesota Department of Transportation launched Minnesota GO — a visioning process to better align the transportation system with what Minnesotans expect for their quality of life, economy, and natural environment. Visioning will help MnDOT and partners prioritize among the multiple goals, objectives, and expectations for the transportation system, and will directly shape an updated Statewide Multimodal Transportation Plan by mid-2012.

To help craft the vision, MnDOT partnered with the University of Minnesota and the Citizens League to engage Minnesotans throughout the state. Fourteen professors at the University and other experts were interviewed to discover key issues facing the state. Three advisory groups were convened to discuss quality of life, economic competitiveness and environmental health. Interactive surveys and videos provided opportunities for youth and other Minnesotans to join the discussion online. Lastly, MnDOT conducted 10 public workshops throughout the state during May and June. Separate youth workshops were also held.



Minnesota and the transportation system are facing many challenges and opportunities, including, but not limited to: an aging population, higher and more volatile energy prices, elevated rates of obesity and other chronic health conditions, budget constraints at all levels of government, increasing global competition, more frequent and severe floods, and new vehicle and telecommunications technologies. In the face of these challenges and opportunities, MnDOT

remains committed to creating a transportation system that will sustain and connect a vital economy, healthy environment, and strong communities.

MnDOT intends to release a draft vision for public review and comment in mid-September. Once adopted, the vision will serve as the framework for the next Statewide Multimodal Transportation Plan.
